NCE the 1920s, when an enterprising pharmacist named Alberto Rendón founded the first one in East Harlem, Manhattan was the epicenter of botánicas in New York.

Now, almost a century later, Queens has become the capital for those looking for baños y despojos (spiritually cleansing baths), multicolor beads, good-luck amulets and talismans.

Most of the stores are located along a strip of Roosevelt Avenue and crisscross Jackson Heights and Corona. Hop on the 7, R, E or F train, get off at the Jackson Heights/Roosevelt Avenue stop and the let the magic begin.

#### BEST FOR HERBAL REMEDIES

Hidden in the corner of a building recessed between 77th and 78th streets along Roosevelt Avenue, **Botánica Mexi**-

cana specializes in items celebrating La Virgen de Guadalupe, the patron saint of Mexico.

But it also specializes in Santa Muerte, a Mexican cult figure associated with protection of and against criminals, as well the remembrance of the dead. Inside, you'll find numerous

amulets and talismans with pictures of Santa Muerte (usually depicted as a skeletal version of the Virgin Mary, scythe in hand).

BEST FOR COOL SHRINES Botánica Santa Barbara is

the place to go if you want to see one of the most beautiful and elaborate saint/orisha shrines in Queens. The statue of the store's namesake, also known as Changó in Santería, is the centerpiece here. Give her an offering of rum and she'll reward you with luck, love and money.

Just behind the wall separating

Santa Barbara/Changó is an exqui-site shrine to Yemaya, the orisha of

the ocean, who is also the guardian of women, childbirth and fertility. Write a wish for her, place it in a seashell and put it in her shrine. She also likes offerings of jew elry, perfume and flowers.

**BEST FOR AMULETS** 

You can't miss the flashy Botánica de el Indio Amazónico. Multicolor neon lights spell out T-A-R-O-T on the front window, with four illustrative cards below. A wooden shelf near the window bends under the weight of good-luck and love perfumes, baños y despojos and statues of saints, orishas and Buddhas, as well as a



life-size photo of the botanica's namesake. An interesting item on the shelves is what looks like a plastic phallus in a mason jar filled with red liquid. It is likely used

for sexual potency. The main draw to the store, of course, is the Amazonian Indian himself, who divines the future through Tarot, palm-reading and other time-honored methods. He also sells a special tonic called "Agua Milagrosa" (miracle water),

which, when you spray it on yourself or around your home, brings good luck.

Packaged in a large, rectangular yellow box, it promises types of benef benefits, including love, abun-dance, luck, fortune, mental strength and success in business.

# BEST FOR CAULDRONS AND OCCULT GEAR

New Candelaria Discounts is the supermarket of all botánicas. Here you can find everything: baños y despojos, herbs for every affliction imaginable, an entire wall devoted to saint and good-luck candles, incense, soaps promising good luck, sexual potency, love and mon-ey, and special bath salts promoting similar benefits.

Alex, the amiable owner of the botánica, is full of helpful mystical advice. For example, he recom-mends smearing honey on one's lips before a job interview to "sweeten" the potential employer to the interviewee.

He also has a large array of pendants swearing numerous benefits, like the bowand-arrow pendant symbolizing Ochosi, the patron orisha of justice and balance. The pendant is often worn to find someone who did you wrong. New Candelaria Dis-

#### **BEST FOR SPIRITUAL** SALVES

Botánica de los Indios Colorados stocks numerous herbal remedies, such as adelgazante, said to help with weight loss; higado, purported to help with liver functioning; and uña de gato and pasuchaca, both believed to boost

the immune system.

Other unique items on the racks include special honeys promising luck, love and success in business and powders guaranteeing that your straying lover will return, a family problem will be resolved, or, if you're a guy feeling slightly less than macho, that your "manli-ness" will be restored. Hey, who needs Viagra when you've got

# **BEST FOR SAINT CARDS**

Botánica la Caridad is a narrow store housing a very large collection of saint statues as well as prayer cards for both Catholic saints and Santería orishas. The prayer cards feature the stan-dard saints but also some lesserknown ones, such as Saint Dymphna, the patron saint of the mentally

#### How to get there:

Take the F train to the Roosevelt Avenue stop, stay to the right and walk north on Roosevelt Avenue. All of the shops are located along Roosevelt Avenue between 78th and 98th streets. If you want to start at Botánica La Caridad, take the 7 train to Junction Boulevard and exit on your right — the shop is toward the right of the station. Then walk south to visit all the remaining stores.
