A PURE DIGITAL VIDEO FLIP ULTRA

The Flip Ultra keeps it simple, stupid, with enough internal memory for one hour of video, integrated editing software, and a pop-out USB dongle for transferring clips to a computer. The new DV tape-based Vixia HV30 delivers 1080i high-def video in a smart package.
