# Local gardeners work city soil for delicious benefits

A collection of farmers from Lafayette — the urban kind — are joining a growing number of alternative farmers across the United States.

Tippecanoe Urban Farmers are a new breed of agriculturally aware community members in the city. The farmers are a mix of self-taught gardeners, a media specialist, a community advocate and a permaculture designer. But this diverse group all have one thing in common: the desire to oring people closer to their

Emily Carter, involved in media for her full-time voca-

tion, is an urban farmer and one of five other members of the group.

"We're less of a business, and more of a club," Carter said. "It was sort of the

brainchild of Ian Thompson." 'He thought we'd be likeminded; we all had very similar ideas about how to bring people closer to their food,

Carter said. When the group first started, the purpose was mainly for providing consultation and labor for community members who were hoping to improve their gardens, explained Ian Thompson, the group's unofficial founder.

"We've backed away from the business part of it to more of an outreach," Thompson

An increased awareness about local farming has started in the past few years across the nation. In November 2011, the U.S. Department of Agriculture released research on direct and intermediated marketing of local foods in the United States.

Small to medium-sized farms were found to dominate local foods sales marketed exclusively through direct-to consumer channels, such as farmers' markets and roadside

stands. Farmers markets are most prominent in the Northeast and the West Coast regions and in areas close to densely populated urban markets.

"Across the country there is a recent increase in people who are revisiting or starting gardens — growing from a balcony to a project that is several city blocks in size," Thompson said. This trend, which started in the coastal regions, is moving to the Midwest, and can be seen in Lafayette with start-up groups such as Tippecanoe Urban Farmers.

Thompson believes the

return to natural food has more to do with the economy than with current trends. He points to major economic crises, and major events such as World War II, as examples of historical times when Americans have increased efforts to grow their own food.

Regardless of the reason behind the shift, Tippecanoe Urban Farmers holds to a simple mission — "We hope to be a resource for the Lafayette area's urban agriculture through creating dialogue and educational opportunities. Our passion is to build a delicious world for all people everywhere.'

"One thing that we're most passionate about is giving back to the community," Carter said.

Growing Power, a Milwaukee-based urban farm initiaspiration for Tippecanoe Urban Farmers. Growing Power found Will Allen seeks to have healthy communities in the city by teaching people to grow healthy food. Tippecanoe Urban Farmers have followed Allen's lead with their involvement in the North 10th Street Co-op Garden in collaboration with Lyn Treece Boys and Girls Club.

"I always plug the North 10th Street garden," Thompson said. He also encourages the public to vote for the garden in the Edy's Fruit Bars contest to win an orchard, which would add fruit trees to the plots of vegetables already in the garden. Voting for the online contest is at www.communities takeroot.com.

'There's a huge interest in growing your own in an urban setting," Carter said. "It's not viewed as being as easy as it actually is. We wanted to bring the food to the city."
