Why am I bringing all of this up? First, because I doubt I'm the only person who experiences these challenges that get in the way of a great camping trip.

Second, and more importantly, because my weekend at <u>Black Tree Resort</u> solved all of those problems, delivering the best camping experience I've had in well over a decade.

It rekindled my love of camping, convinced my wife that spending a weekend in the woods could actually be fun (which was not an easy task), and provided the rare chance to reconnect with nature without having to worry about gear, food, and supplies.

What is Black Tree Resort?

Black Tree Resort is a luxury glamping resort that curates comfortable, customized camping adventures for families, active couples, and groups.

The resort's five-star service and amenities blend the authentic camping experience with modern conveniences and creature comforts, delivering an upscale retreat that'll please everyone from outdoor enthusiasts to those who typically prefer hotels and room service.

"Black Tree Resort is a study in contrasts, where rustic modern lives amidst the trees," says Nabil Saweeres, the founder and owner of Black Tree Resort. "We don't compete with nature — we complement her, ultimately giving guests the best of both worlds."

The goal at Black Tree Resort is to take care of everything that goes into a memorable camping trip, so that guests can focus on what's most important — family, friends, and reconnecting with nature.

"Guests will encounter nature without the hassle of buying and packing camping equipment or preparing meals," says Saweeres. "Leave the hard work to us. Our kitchen delivers fresh, local, Colorado cuisine for breakfast, lunch, and dinner."

Building The Dream

The story behind Black Tree Resort is nearly as exciting as the destination itself.

Nabil Saweeres grew up near Lake George, Colorado, and though his career took him to New York City he never lost his love for the great outdoors.

He and his wife Cindy planned frequent camping trips to pass their love of nature on to their children, and they quickly ran into the same gripes that we've already discussed.

Camping out of state made it doubly difficult, as there was no way they could just pack up the family car and drive from the Big Apple to Colorado.

The natural solution was upgrading from camping to glamping.

Nabil and Cindy were relieved to find that glampgrounds solved the issue of purchasing gear and packing the car, and the comfy backcountry beds made the camping trips just as enjoyable for mom and dad as it was for the kids.

Still, the glampgrounds that they visited couldn't solve every problem.

They had to bring food and groceries to cook their meals, which is a challenge when you're coming from out of state.

Ushering their kids through shared shower facilities and bathrooms wasn't always a pleasant experience, and they frequently found that many glampgrounds packed the campsites so close together that seclusion was out of the question.

Over the years, thoughts of "I wish this were better" led to "here's how I'd fix that."

Saweeres started sketching designs for the ideal campsites and tents, and the dream of opening his own luxury glamping resort took root.

In 2014, after five years of brainstorming, researching, and designing, Nabil and Cindy decided it was finally time to pursue their dream.

They moved to Denver, where Saweeres spent the next three years refining his ideas while looking for the perfect tract of land.

Once they acquired the property in Lake George (which we'll talk more about later), it took another year to get the proper permits and approvals from local authorities.

A year later — five years after moving to Colorado and 10 years after the idea first took root — Black Tree Resort finally opened in June of 2019.

It's a story of hard work, patience, and perseverance, and the work isn't over yet.

Saweeres personally runs the resort, working tirelessly behind the scenes to whip up delicious meals and provide a level of service that's usually reserved for five-star hotels.

When you get a chance to meet Saweeres during your stay at Black Tree Resort — and you inevitably will, whether he's lighting your campfire, feeding wood into your stove, or answering a customer service call at 5am — he'll greet you with a genuine smile that shows you just how much he loves this.

Ultimately, Saweeres hopes that guests will achieve what he calls the Black Tree state of mind.

"It's experienced when we are wholly present, aware of both those we are with, and the beauty that surrounds us," says Saweeres.

"Where we are free from daily routines and invited into the tranquility of the outdoors. Where the night sky becomes a theater for conversation and connection. Where peace and rest can take residence, and one can find both solitude and connectedness."

I'll avoid the "labor of love" cliche, but it's inspiring to see someone actively building their dream — especially when that dream involves helping people hit the pause button on their busy lives to find solace (and a healthy dose of fun) in the great outdoors.

What To Expect At Black Tree Resort

Black Tree Resort delivers the comfort and conveniences of modern life without sacrificing what the great outdoors have to offer.

Here's a rundown of the resort's prime location and enviable accommodations.

Location

Black Tree Resort is located in <u>Lake George</u>, <u>Colorado</u>. That's a little over an hour west of Colorado Springs, and just over two hours from Denver.

The resort sits on 80 acres of forested land that's encompassed by <u>Pike National Forest</u>. Envision secluded campsites blanketed by forest, a thriving wildlife population, and scenic views for miles, and you'll get the picture.

When you're not lounging around the campsite, there's plenty to do around Lake George.

<u>Eleven Mile Canyon Reservoir</u> is just down the road, while <u>Spinney Mountain State Park</u> and <u>Florissant Fossil Beds National Monument</u> are a short drive to the west and east (respectively).

The campground is enveloped by Pike National Forest, so it goes without saying that magnificent views and hiking trails can be found in any direction.

Campground Amenities

After guests check in at the front office, they'll receive an electric golf cart that makes traveling around the expansive campground quick and easy.

If you're wondering why you need a golf cart for a campground, the campsites are well spaced across the 80 acre property.

As in, you could drink your morning coffee in your underoos on the porch and the neighboring campers wouldn't see a thing.

So the golf cart isn't just a luxury — it's a necessity when you need to get from your campsite to the shower facility or reach your vehicle in the parking lot.

That brings us to two major amenities that make Black Tree Resort unique in the glamping world.

First, each campsite features a private bathroom with a sink and toilet.

It's a short 100-foot walk from the tent to the bathroom, yet it's far enough away that the bathroom doesn't detract from the campsite.

Keep in mind we're talking about a clean, modern bathroom with hot and cold water and a flush toilet. Not to trivialize the rest of the glamping experience, but this is possibly the best amenity for the ladies in your family.

As if one private bathroom isn't enough, the resort features a bath house near the front office.

Walk through the exterior door and you'll find a hallway lined with locked doors leading to private bathrooms, replete with a modern shower, toilet, sink, and cabinet space to store your toiletries.

The resort provides plush towels, shampoo, conditioner, soap, and a hair dryer for your convenience.

Campsites

Prepare yourself to be impressed the moment your golf cart rolls up to your private campsite.

Immediately commanding your attention when you reach the campsite is the immaculately designed tent.

The walled tents sit on a wooden platform with the sides bolted to the floor, featuring multiple zip-open mesh windows to let in fresh air and a bug screen at the entrance to keep the pests at bay.

Towering above the tent is a canvas awning that provides a second layer of protection from the elements, as well as shade for the covered porch area.

All of this is held together by massive timbers and thick cables, giving it an unbelievably sturdy and handsomely rustic aesthetic.

In addition to the cushioned seating on the deck, the campsite includes a picnic table where you can enjoy meals and games outdoors.

There's also a stately fire pit surrounded by Adirondack chairs, with tree stumps that function as convenient side-tables for when you're making s'mores.

Inside The Tent

Head through the double doors into your tent and you'll find yourself in a veritable cabin.

The tents are fully furnished with handcrafted furniture, including two queen beds, a roll-out dining table for games and meals, several nightstands, a side table, a cushioned loveseat, and a beautiful rustic chandelier hanging from the ceiling.

The tents are 100% solar-powered, and you can easily control the lights using a remote control.

There's also a solar-powered battery under the nightstand with power outlets where you can plug in your phone charger.

Snuggle up in bed and you'll find cozy linens, iconic Pendleton blankets, and plush pillows.

There are a few extra blankets under the bed in case you get chilly, but that shouldn't be an issue with the wood burning stove inside the tent.

Service

Last but certainly not least, let's talk about Black Tree Resort's unrivaled level of service.

The resort is all-inclusive, meaning breakfast, lunch, dinner, and non-alcoholic drinks (including coffee!) are included with your nightly rate.

Saweeres cooks the meals himself in the resort's commercial kitchen, and the staff personally delivers the meals to your tent.

Of all the resort's luxury offerings, the room service (or tent service?) delivers the proudest moments for Saweeres and his crew.

Whether it's delivering hot coffee at 5am, dropping off a snack during a midnight poker game, cooking fresh fish that you caught down the road at the lake, or accommodating special dietary requests, he and his team take immense pride in going above and beyond guests' expectations.

Activities

Black Tree Resort also functions as guests' full-service adventure concierge, able to arrange any combination of <u>local activities</u> to make your stay memorable and exciting.

Whether that involves chartering a fishing boat, arranging a guided ATV tour, or planning a whitewater rafting adventure, they'll coordinate everything so you don't have to worry about a thing.

Some of the popular local activities at your disposal include:

Black Tree Resort delivered an unbelievable experience for me because they anticipated my needs and went above and beyond anything I expected.

No packing, no worrying, no stressing — absolutely zero hassle.

Having private bathrooms, a cozy bed, and a heated tent eliminated the common pain-points that usually push me and my wife towards a cabin over camping.

The temperature dropped into the 30s while we were there, yet the wood burning stove kept the tent so warm you'd have thought it was summer.

I was wildly impressed by the luxury amenities at our campsite, from the engraved propane fire pit to the beautifully handcrafted furniture.

I felt like I was checking into a five-star hotel, but the elegance and premium features never took away the rustic feel of camping in the forest.

The seclusion of our campsite also helped to preserve the authentic camping experience. At night I could see the campfire of the next camp in the distance, but there was no human contact.

I felt completely alone, apart from the world and enveloped by the soothing arms of nature — exactly how camping should feel.

In summary, Black Tree Resort provided the care-free lifestyle of an all-inclusive hotel, the comfort of staying in a furnished, heated cabin, and the simple joy of camping.

That's a rare combination, and one that I'm already looking forward to experiencing again next summer.

Who's it For?

Black Tree Resort is perfect for small families, as the two queen beds and seating easily accommodates a family of four.

For me, the luxury amenities and "tent service" meals far outweigh the inability to BYOB.

Plus, you can get all of the beer, wine, and cocktails you need from the resort, and the concierge is happy to accommodate special requests so that you can still enjoy your favorite drink by the campfire.

My Recommendation

It shouldn't come as a surprise that I'm clearly a fan of <u>Black Tree Resort</u>. If you're considering a camping or <u>glamping trip in Colorado</u>, this magical place should be at the top of your list.
