



Things to do

The name of Freeport's Harraseeket River is derived from an American Indian dialect meaning the "river of many fish." What better location for Leon Leonwood Bean (L.L. Bean) to establish his world-famous hunting, fishing, and sporting business? More than 3 million people visit the flagship store each year, open 24 hours a day. The extensive camping, boating, and biking departments put you on the right path for a great experience outdoors. The neighboring Hunting & Fishing Store offers everything for a successful trip (except the game and fish-those you have to supply), and the newly opened Bike & Boat Store attracts people of all ages. Enjoy fun family events on the L.L.Bean Campus, including the 25th annual Maine summer PaddleSports Festival on June 24 and 25. A summer concert series in the Discovery Park delights listeners every Saturday night from July 4 through Labor Day weekend with jazz, folk, blues, and zydeco.



Green Design Furniture Co.

For an elegant side of Maine, travel to Portland's historic Old Port district to Green Design Furniture Co. Founded in 1993 by inventor and designer Douglas Green, it's one of the few remaining artisan furniture manufacturers that produce the work of a contemporary designer. Each solid cherry piece is crafted by talented hands within the lines of

Green's exclusive, patented system of construction. When you purchase Green Design's furniture, you're in a select group, as fewer than 1,000 pieces are crafted each year. Continuing with tradition, the first 100 pieces of a new design are numbered and signed by Green and the craftsman. Entertainment gurus rejoice in Green Design's proud introduction of its new Neehi series. The collection's pieces are created for owners of thin-profile televisions in search of a beautiful and efficient all-in-one package to display them.



Well-known Thos. Moser Cabinetmakers' Freeport flagship showroom is a 19th-century home restored to its historic grandeur and furnished with two floors of Moser's exquisite pieces. The classic furniture style is guided by the mission to build furniture that celebrates the natural beauty of wood with a simple, unadorned, graceful line. Thos. Moser ties several mindsets together—the discipline of classic Japanese joinery, the untutored aesthetics of the American Shaker period of the 1830s and 1840s, and the sophisticated German Bauhaus of the 1920s. The showroom also boasts a wide selection of fine crafts, handwoven Swans Island Blankets, hand-blown glass lamps and glassware from Simon Pearce, as well as more than 40 works by the state's most prominent artists, celebrating

the beauty of Maine. Stop in and after browsing, have the folks there direct you (via pretty backroads) up to the store's Auburn headquarters to see the pieces crafted and meet some of the woodworkers.

Take a ride down memory lane at the **Owls Head Transportation Museum.** In the heart of Maine's midcoast, conveniently close to beautiful Penobscot Bay, the museum is home to an operating collection of 75 antique autos, 25 antique planes, bicycles, carriages, and motorcycles. Experience the "open flightline," with a stroll along the grass airstrip for a close up look at the airplanes and meet the museum's pilots when they aren't flying above during the Antique Aeroplane shows. See what it was like in the Tin Lizzy days with a free ride in a classic Model T. A must-see stop is the Engine Room, home to more than 30 vintage engines, many of them operable. Springtime brings great outdoor opportunities, including the Hot Rods, Customs, Muscle Cars & Antique Aeroplane Show on June 11 and the Convertible Meet & Antique Aeroplane Show on June 25.

Forget about the winter woes that Maine conjures in your memory. With all these lovely outdoor adventures, who has time to think of flurries and flakes? There is sunshine for the taking!
