"Bill & Ted's Excelon Adventure" ★★ (Comedy, 1998) A pair of hapless computer programmers (Edward Norton, Edward Furlong) accidentally integrate their company's computer system with the supercomputers at the Pentagon.


"Calico Commerce" ★★ (Drama, 1999) Two humane society workers (Bradley Whitford, Richard Schiff) go undercover to break up a ring of cat burglars (Emilio Estevez, Charlie Sheen) selling felines through pet stores and over the Web.

"Commerce One, Treasury Zero" ★ (Comedy, 1997) Rival U.S. Cabinet secretaries (Tim Conway, Harvey Korman) wreak havoc as they try to one-up each other in Washington high society.

"Descartes Before the Horse" ★★★★ (Drama, 1983) A philosopher and mathematician (Gerard Depardieu) conquers his fear of equestrian pursuits and eventually heads up a delivery service serving the entire French countryside.

"Dying Young" ★★ (Drama, 1998) A young dot-com executive (Campbell Scott) finds there's nothing he can do to save his floundering e-market.

"Free Markets" ★★ (Comedy, 1994) The nephew (Michael J. Fox) of a grocery magnate (Fritz Weaver) begins to suspect his uncle is crazy after the man inauguates reverse auctions for all the food in the stores.

"I Too" ★★★ (Drama, 1990) A little boy (Macaulay Culkin) insists on tagging along with his father (Harrison Ford) as the man investigates what's plaguing his company's worldwide supply chain.

"Interwoven Lives" ★★★ (Drama, 1998) At a conference in New Orleans, a small group of Web site developers (Hugh Grant, Renee Zellweger, Philip Seymour Hoffman, Ewan McGregor) meet and discover the difference between content and being content.

"Line56" ★ (Science Fiction, 1995) A family (Bruce Willis, Demi Moore, Liv Tyler) struggle with life in a grim futuristic society where getting even the necessities of life requires standing in queues for hours on end.

"Open Market" ★★ (Comedy, 1998) Two competing real estate agents (David Schwimmer, Mathew Perry) and their clients (Courteney Cox, Jennifer Aniston) bid against each other for the same 900 square-foot house in Silicon Valley owned by two eccentric dot-com millionaires (Matt LeBlanc, Lisa Kudrow).

"Purchase Pros" ★★★★ (Comedy, 1998) Two teen-age girls (Hilary Swank, Angelina Jolie) wreak havoc as they try to one-up each other in the boutiques on Fifth Avenue.

"SciQuest 2012" ★★ (Science Fiction, 1997) A scientific mission to research the manufacture and sale of chemicals on an international space station goes awry when a pair of technicians (David Spade, Enrico Colantoni) discover there is no liquidity in outer space.

"VerticalNet" ★ (Thriller, 1999) A trapeze performer (Ryan Phillippe) is crippled when a malevolent roustabout (Harry Dean Stanton) sets up the safety apparatus perpendicular to the ground instead of parallel.

"Vignettes of Spring" ★★★★ (Drama, 1996) Slow-moving French film about a quartet of women (Juliette Binoche, Julianne Moore, Juliette Lewis, Julia Roberts) trying to cull through the piles of fashion catalogs that have been piling up since the Christmas holidays.
